Surfside residents may be confused about when to call 911 or the Surfside Police Department non-emergency number. The 911 call center is responsible for receiving, processing and dispatching 911 calls for Surfside and other local jurisdictions. **Calling 911 is the most efficient and fastest way to have Surfside Police Officers respond to a life-threatening emergency.**

The Police Department offers residents a police non-emergency number (305) 861-4862. This is for informational purposes and general questions. It is also used for minor issues when there is no immediate threat, such as parking violations, animal-related issues, non-criminal matters and criminal matters that happened in the past.
